VICE PRESIDENT Nominee: Jessica A. Rueter, PhD

The 2014 election brings an important decision for the membership of CEDS. During this election, we will be electing a new Vice President. Some refer to this office as the president-elect, which is also an accurate description. The successful VP candidate will rep-

resent CEDS at headquarters and the CEC conference for two years as a member of the Program Advisory Committee (PAC) during the time that the upcoming national conference is planned. In conjunction with the summer PAC meeting, the VP also represents CEDS at the Leadership Conference, which takes place at headquarters the two days prior to the PAC meeting. The VP also has a vital role in the success of the CEDS conference by helping locate venues as well as planning the conference and program to be presented. The VP serves a two-year term, which directly moves into a two-year term as president and then concludes in a two-year term as past-president/ Representative Assembly member.

Jessica A. Rueter is an assistant professor at The University of Texas at Tyler in the School of Education. Dr. Rueter has 19 years of experience as a special education teacher, educational diagnostician, and university professor. She has several publications to her credit and is a frequent speaker at the international, national, and state levels. She is an assessment consultant to school districts in East Texas and in the Dallas/Fort Worth metropolitan area and has served as an expert witness in due process

hearings. Her research interests include best practices for assessment of students with disabilities and translation of assessment results into evidence-based instructional practices. Dr. Rueter currently serves as the past-president of the Texas Council for Exceptional Children and is a member of the Council for Exceptional Children, Council for Educational Diagnostic Services, Small Special Education Program Caucasus, Council for Learning Disabilities, and the Texas Educational Diagnostician Association. If she is elected as vice-president, her primary goals are to grow the membership of CEDS and to provide CEDS members with high-quality professional development opportunities.

TREASURER

Nominee: Elizabeth Hennington, EdD

The term of the treasurer is three years. The role of the treasurer is to act as the financial manager of the organization. From basic deposits and payment of bills to filing our organizational taxes, the treasurer is imperative to the success of CEDS. A successful candidate



should plan on spending an average of 10 hours a month on CEDS work; while there will be busier times (during conference) and off time, 10 hours a month is a good average to expect. Taxes are simple to file, and there are many years of history to use as you file the required documents each fall.

Dr. Elizabeth Hennington is an assistant professor in the Behavioral Sciences Department at Lubbock Christian University. She is currently working on researching the role of the educational diagnostician and comparisons of face-to-face versus online programming in higher education. Her goals as treasurer include maintaining efficient financial records for CEDS, furthering the field of assessment for more effective intervention, and increasing the awareness of CEDS. Elizabeth has served as the treasurer for CEDS for the past three years.

Ten Great Reasons to Attend an Annual Conference

The 2014 Council for Exceptional Children Annual Convention will be held April 9–12 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. If you do not attend, you will miss these Top 10 highlights of the 2014 convention:

- 1. Session choices. Convention Program Chair Russell Gersten and the Program Advisory Committee have planned more than 800 sessions. Topical sessions will address such issues as teacher effectiveness, universal design for learning, collaboration, response to intervention, evidence-based instructional strategies, Common Core state standards, restraint and seclusion, alternative schools, autism, mental health, classroom management, and much more!
- 2. High-caliber keynote speaker. Andrew Solomon will give the keynote address on Wednesday, April 9th, at 5:00 p.m. at the Pennsylvania Convention Center. His most current book, *Far From the Tree: Parents, Children and the Search for Identity,*



recounts the stories of people meeting the challenges of parenting children with physical, mental, and social disabilities. Solomon won the 2001 National Book Award for Nonfiction with his last book, *The Noonday Demon: An Atlas of Depression*, and was a finalist for the 2002 Pulitzer Prize.

- **3.** International and national perspectives. Session presenters represent innovative researchers and practitioners from the United States and around the world.
- 4. National Certification of Educational Diagnosticians exam. The NCED exam leads to national certification for practicing educational diagnosticians, a notable achievement. NCED board members will provide information and



inspiration for aspiring certificate recipients.

5. Reflection and inspiration. Outstanding presentations provide multiple opportunities for personal reflection. Conference attendees reported renewed energy, a plethora of ideas for improving professional practices, and a sense of clarity of purpose.

- 6. Networking opportunities and CEDS social. Professional conferences provide an opportunity to interact with professionals from across the United States. The Thursday evening CEDS social will offer great food, great conversation, and even greater door prizes.
- **7. Interaction with the CEDS Board.** CEDS board members will be available to listen to concerns of the membership and to solicit ideas for improving the organization. Attendees will be given opportunities to volunteer for committee participation within the CEDS board.
- 8. Destination: Philadelphia. *The City of Brotherly Love* is a perfect site for the 2014 conference. The cultural diversity embodied in the art, museums, restaurants, Reading Market, Liberty Bell, Independence Hall, the Historic District, and cinema icons provide endless opportunities for sightseeing and fun.
- **9.** Chance to take the stage. Poster and lecture sessions provide opportunities for new and seasoned researchers to share information with their assessment colleagues. Graduate students can share their research and brainstorm ideas for future projects. [The call for presentations/posters for the fall 2015 CEDS conference in New Orleans will be issued in the spring of 2015.]
- **10.** Comments from past conferences: While there are most likely countless reasons that professionals choose to attend national conferences, comments from attendees of the 2013 CEDS Conference in Weehawken, New Jersey, share some of the highlights of their conference experiences:
 - It was great to have a chance to exchange ideas and to meet so many others in the profession.
 - I learned new strategies, discovered new resources, and was able to pick up some new books.
 - I loved the keynote speaker and the legislative updates. This conference gave me information that I could not have received through my school district.
 - I learned information about the tests and test administration that will improve my professional practice.
 - I took the NCED exam AND had an opportunity for professional development too!

Professional Standards Report

The Knowledge and Skills Subcommittee (K&SS) met via conference call on December 18, 2013. The purpose of this meeting was to respond to a request from Robin Brewer,



president-elect of CEC, to provide input regarding the feasibility of the Workgroup recommendations that had been discussed at the October 2013 CEC Board Meeting. These recommendations were returned to the Professional Standards and Practices Standing Committee (PSPC) as the means to seek input from divisions, the IDC, and unit leadership before making recommendations to the CEC Board.

The PSPC studies the area of practice standards and advises the Board of Directors regarding CEC professional policies and activities. Other duties include developing guidelines and materials to assist the field in meeting the Council's professional standards. The

PSPC was charged with considering these recommendations, along with recommendations from the divisions, before considering any process changes.

The K&SS members who participated in the December conference call provided feedback on each of the Workgroup report's sections:

- 1. Principles
- 2. Types of standards
- 3. Frequency of revisions
- 4. Standards leadership
- **5.** Committee size
- 6. Appointment criteria & PSPC membership
- 7. PSPC responsibilities
- 8. Work groups/subcommittees
- 9. Resources

The summary of the input from the K&SS is that the K&SS, which includes representatives from each of the CEC divisions, should replace the proposed PSPC and provide leadership for the standards development.

At this time the K&SS awaits clarification from the PSPC regarding which sets of standards (initial, advanced, practice, ethical) should be incorporated into one set of standards. Once this feedback is received, the K&SS can continue to work to complete the validation of the standards that appear in draft form on the CEC website.
